Play is so important in the lives of children. Play teaches confidence, trust, sharing, problem solving and more. Providing a developmentally appropriate environment promotes play that makes children feel more confident, independent, and expressive.

What are some examples of what you would see in a classroom with Developmentally Appropriate Practice (DAP)?

- · Children offered choices
- · Small group activities, based on interest
- Successful participation at any skill level
- Teachers facilitating play by asking open-ended questions and providing materials to extend the play

According to the 2019/20 YoungStar Evaluation Criteria, "Developmentally appropriate practice requires teachers to meet children where they are and help them to reach goals that are both challenging and achievable." DAP is based on the philosophy that children are competent and trustworthy, and can make good decisions if given the opportunity and practice.

What does it mean to have toys and materials accessible for children?

Developmentally appropriate toys and materials should be available and reachable; use age appropriate shelving, or place in locations where children can easily and safely get to the toys and materials they want to play with.

YoungStar Technical Consultants Partner With Child Care Providers

TC Lori Shafranski Shares Her Experience

Each YoungStar Technical Consultant (TC) visit is an opportunity to partner with child care providers on issues that are important to them. These visits focus on the needs of the child care program. "On a first visit, I might ask child care providers, 'How do you see us spending our time together?" says YoungStar Technical Consultant, Lori Shafranski.

Regulated child care providers can choose to receive Technical Assistance when they apply to the YoungStar program. The Technical Consultant (TC) guides the program through the process of getting training and technical assistance and then the program will complete a YoungStar rating. Programs can choose to have their Technical Assistance before or after being rated. Before a program is rated, a TC can work with a child care provider to help them decide what areas to focus on for Technical Assistance.

During a YoungStar visit, child care providers are able to talk about challenges that they are having. A TC can offer guidance on a variety of issues like: snow day policies, responding to children who bite, upcoming training opportunities, applying developmentally appropriate practice strategies, and more.

Child Care Owner/Operator Brook Seevers says, "Our time with our technical consultant has been nothing short of invaluable. She answers questions concerning anything regarding our center from policies and procedures to what types of materials and/or furniture are age appropriate for our classrooms. Lori has helped us decide what is best practice for our program and has given us piece of mind knowing she is helping to make us the best that we can be for the little ones we serve along with their families."

YoungStar consultation is individual to each program. YoungStar consultants build relationships and offer support to assist child care providers. Lori believes, "Listening is such an important part of my work with child care providers. I hope during our time together the child care providers feel heard and know that I want to learn about them and help them accomplish the goals they have each year."

Start with your goal(s), then go searching for your activities:

WMELS B.EL.1 Creativity and Imagination: Engages in imaginative play and inventive thinking through interactions with people, materials and environment. We can give children specific materials to help them retell a story exactly as it is told – which is a great skill but here we are talking more about them using their imagination and creativity. Collect cardboard pieces from boxes that appliances or other fragile things come in (see photo) and add to the sand table or the block corner. Add a few animals, people, props and encourage creating a story. These pieces can also be painted since they are cardboard. You could also consider as a group looking at one of the pieces and imagine what you could pretend it is....with minimal guidance if needed (a bridge, a house, a pond, a hat...)

Family meals allow parents to be role models who create a supportive environment that promotes healthy eating. Family meals don't just mean better nutrition. Children of families who regularly eat together also are more likely to have higher intakes of fruits and vegetables and have a healthy weight, and are less likely to have behavior problems or use drugs, cigarettes or alcohol when they get older. Plus, they're closer to their parents. No wonder family meals are on the upswing.
