# 5STEPS TO FINDING QUALITY CHILD CARE

# **1**

#### **Start Early**

Finding the right child care program can take some time. Start your search early, as many programs have wait lists for specific ages.

# **2**

#### Get A Referral

#### Contact Your Local Child Care Resource & Referral Agency

Begin your search by calling your local **Child Care Resource & Referral (CCR&R) Agency**. A referral specialist will search for child care programs in your area that meet your family's needs and check if the programs have openings.

### Make sure to ask your CCR&R these questions:

- ☐ What are the regulation requirements?
- ☐ How can I get information about complaints and violations?
- Does the child care program participate in YoungStar?
- Are there programs available to help with the cost of child care?

#### Visit and Ask Questions

#### Stay Involved

After you make a choice, stay involved. You and your child's provider are now partners.

Here are some ways to get involved:

- Talk with your child's provider on a regular basis.
- Visit your child at the child care program and read a book with the group.
- Join in special events and holidays, like field trips, Valentine's Day, etc.

# CHILD CARE KEY INDICATORS OF QUALITY

Visit all child care programs you are considering. Find out about these key indicators of quality:

# Provider's Education and Training

- Ask about education and ongoing training completed by the child care provider.
- Are child care providers and other staff trained in CPR and First Aid?

### Learning Environment and Curriculum

- Are there areas and materials available to promote meaningful and engaging play? For example, art, blocks, books, dramatic play, math, science, and sensory (sand/water).
- Does the program have a daily schedule that allows for active and quiet periods?
- Are infants allowed to follow their own schedule?
- Does the child care provider engage in conversation during activities?

### Business and Professional Practices

Does the child care program have a parent handbook outlining all their policies and procedures?

#### Health and Well-Being

- Does the child care program provide time for physical activity?
